If COVID-19 Restrictions are Lifted

If social-distancing requirements in schools and on buses, each set by the Department of Health and New York State guidance are lifted, we will re-open; we will go back to full-time Brick and Mortar at all levels. We will need some time to ensure the transition back to full-time Brick and Mortar school is done in an educationally sound manner.

COVID-19 Procedures

Great News: Department of Health data and statements indicate that efforts made by Commack schools to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission is working!

"Close Contact" is defined by the Department of Health as within six (6) feet for 10 minutes or more, over a 24-hour period.

Due to the lack of spread in schools, effective, November 11, 2020, NEW Department of Health guidance states that only those who are in "Close Contact" with a positive case must quarantine. Previous guidance quarantined those who were in "Proximate Contact" with a positive case, which is defined by the Department of Health as being in the same enclosed environment such as a classroom but greater than six (6) feet.



"After consultation with state officials today, NYSPHSAA has confirmed low and moderate risk winter sports (bowling, gymnastics, indoor track & field, skiing and swimming & diving) <u>are</u> permitted to be played. NYSPHSAA has established November 30th as the winter sports start date. At this time, authorization has not been provided for high risk sports to begin play. The high-risk sports start date continues to be examined and will be revised if needed but is contingent upon authorization from state officials." – Dr. Robert Zayas, NYSPHSAA Executive Director

The State Education Department has stated that low and moderate risk sports for our winter seasons are currently approved. This will include Boys and Girls Bowling, Boys Swimming, Boys and Girls Fencing and Boys and Girls Winter Track beginning January 4, 2021, per Section XI and VIII guidance. The Commack Schools has a fully developed COVID-19 compliant plan for tryouts and participation.

We remain optimistic that the State will authorize high risk sports such as Basketball, Wrestling and Competitive Cheer. However, at this time, said sports are not authorized for 20-21.



EARLY LITERACY GRADES K - 2


FALL 2019 VS. 2020






MATHEMATICS GRADES K - 2

FALL 2019 VS. 2020 COMPARISON









Potential Sale of Smith's Lane

Sale can only take place with Community vote approval (like the bond vote)

Contract being approved tonight for Schacker Realty to represent the District and Community's interest.

Terms:

- 2% if the District brings the buyer
- 3.5% if sold by single broker
- 4% if split with another broker

At this time, the Board of Education has met with the broker as have the District Administration and the plan moving forward is to engage the community.



Anti-Vaping Task Force

Policy Update

Board of Education Policy: Updates

In May 2019 the Board of Education adopted its fully-revised and comprehensive Board of Education Policy book.

At that time, the <u>Board of Education Policy</u>
<u>Review Committee</u> was implemented with the <u>purpose of regularly reviewing and updating</u>
<u>Board Policy</u>.

The Committee has been and continues to engage in this work.

Policy Updates on Tonight's Agenda:

- Policy #5670 Records Management
 - Recommendation: Revision to existing policy
 - Why?: Due to changes in law/regulation which identify the need to reference Schedule LGS-1, not ED-1.
- Policy #6411 use of email in the District Records Management and Policy
 - Recommendation: Revision to existing policy
 - Why?: Due to changes in law/regulation which identify the need to reference Schedule LGS-1, not ED-1.
- Policy #5676 Privacy and Security for Student Data and Teacher and Principal Data
 - Recommendation: Revision to existing policy
 - Why?: Due to NYSED updating Ed. Law 2d and Parent Bill of Rights requirements. In addition, revisions due to changes to retention law, as indicated in the policies above.
