

Resource Room *Elementary*

The purpose of Resource Room is to provide supplemental instruction to target specific skill deficits.



Resource Room *Secondary*

Special Education Teacher provides specialized supplementary small group instruction to aid students in benefitting from general education classroom instruction.

Fulfilled through an everyday resource room class period (5:1 Ratio)

Focus on IEP goals through curriculum

Organizational, study skills, and test taking skills

Integrated Co-Teaching: Primary

- An integrated co-teaching class is a general education class with up to 12 students identified as special education.
- A special education teacher pushes into the classroom for part of the day to provide instruction and support.
- Additionally, a teacher assistant, is present to provide reinforcement of previously taught skills throughout the day.
- Learning expectations are the same for all students.
 Adaptations may be made to the instructional delivery and/or materials so that identified students may acquire necessary knowledge and skills.





Integrated Co-Teaching: Intermediate

- An integrated co-teaching class is a general education class with up to 12 students identified as special education.
- Full-time general education teacher and a full-time special education teacher. (2023-2024 School Year)
- Students have opportunity to work in a flexible learning environment where they will receive instruction in all content areas.
- All instruction is co-taught using a variety of data driven instructional methodologies to support student learning within the classroom and foster independence.
- Learning expectations are the same for all students. Adaptations may be made to the instructional delivery and/or materials so that identified students may acquire necessary knowledge and skills.






Integrated Co-Teaching: *Secondary*

- Provides academic and speciallydesigned instruction in the general education setting to an integrated group of students
- Planning and delivery of instruction is shared by General Education Teacher and Special Education Teacher
- Supported by a programmatic Skills Class one period per day





Special Class:12:1 Elementary

- Students who require instruction within a small group or who need significant modifications to materials and instructional methodology may be recommended for the special class program.
- Special Class Programs are also considered for students who have moderate to significant management needs that prevent them from accessing learning.



Special Class 15:1 Commack Middle School Grades 6-8



- ❖ A highly structured learning environment designed to effectively meet the individual needs of each student
- Facilitate a multi-modal approach to learning
- Allows for flexibility of instructional pacing as well as pedagogical approaches to learning
- Learning environment maximizes opportunities for individualized skill development, application and skill transfer.

- Students receive explicit instruction in Approaches to Learning Skills (Skills for lifelong learning)

Special Class: 15:1 Commack High School

- Provides primary instruction for content areas that is specially-designed to meet the needs of students
- Smaller class size ratio (15:1)
- Pacing of class based on student needs
- Taught by a Special Education Teacher
- Specific Math courses, Science (Living Environment, Earth and the Environment, Forensics and Horticulture, ELA 9-12, and Social Studies 9-12

Special Class: 8:1:2 and 8:1:3 Elementary Model

- The teacher individualizes educational programs to meet the strengths and weaknesses of students.
- The students are grouped according to age and similarity of need, with an age range of no more than 36 months.
- Students receive individualized instruction throughout the day to work on specific goals. Discrete trial work is done during this time if needed.
- Opportunities to interact with typical peers are built into the program.
- Programmatic parent training is provided to families by the school psychologist assigned to the class.
- Behavioral consultant services are provided to the class weekly.

Each 8:1:2 section works alongside programmatic staff such as a programmatic speech/language pathologist, programmatic psychologist, and a programmatic behavior consultant. All members of the school team collaborate and work together to develop a program that addresses the needs of the whole child while enriching each individual's educational experience and maximizing overall success.

The goal during a child's middle school years is to foster and increase independence throughout all areas of discipline. During 6th, 7th, and 8th grade the children participate in a variety of lessons and functional activities to help them grow. Below are the areas in which we will help foster and increase independence:

- academically, socially, emotionally as well as real-life applications
- building an internal desire to be as independent as possible
- understanding the importance of being independent
- learning to self-advocate

- 6-week summer program for eligible students to support maintenance of skills and abilities achieved over the school year
- Half day and full day for recommended special class students
- Related services available for students whose needs require it
- Our program is held at the newly refurbished Cedar Road School



Occupational Therapy Support Push-in to Kindergarten

- Weekly push-in to support all students' fine motor skills, pre-writing skills, letter formation and sizing.
- OT goes into support during Fundations writing units and works with the classroom teacher, support staff and students to ensure age-appropriate grip, paper stabilization and overall writing skills.
- One time monthly the OT presents a lesson to the class to work on supporting fine motor skills and upper body strength to support all student's ability to complete classroom tabletop assignments.
- Data is collected to ensure all students are demonstrating age-appropriate skills.
- At the end of 12 weeks any student who demonstrate continued weaknesses in these areas will be pulled for small group targeted supports during this classroom push-in time.



Kindergarten Phonemic Awareness Curriculum

30 phonemic awareness push in lessons, delivered weekly, to all kindergarten classrooms by a speech/language pathologist in collaboration with classroom teachers.

Curriculum materials were designed by Commack staff members utilizing different tools (e.g., Heggerty, Hear Builder) and teacher created lesson plans. Multisensory, interactive format, with ongoing data collection.

Skills taught include rhyming, sound blending, isolating initial sounds, and phoneme manipulation of initial, final, and medial sounds.



- Transitional care: In person, short term care or virtual services until a referral can be established.




